



Cathedral Arts leadership recently launched a period of strategic planning in advance of its tenth anniversary, reviewing nine years of remarkable experiences and growth. An informal organizational structure has been codified and new leadership identified. Major changes include the appointment of artistic directors for each of the three major categories of Cathedral Arts offerings: Sacred and Secular Performing Arts, and Visual Arts. We're delighted to announce three names already familiar to Cathedral Arts patrons who will till these roles beginning in June 2021: Monica Awbrey, a distinguished educator, performer and conductor of the Cathedral Arts Choral Artists, will oversee Sacred Performing Arts events. Mary Dibbern, a superb pianist, vocal coach and noted author who has graced many Cathedral Arts events, will assume the role of Artistic Director for Secular Performing Arts. Keith Franks, Cathedral Director of Music and Organist, will serve as the principal liaison to Cathedral Arts. Evelyn Luciani has curated and installed major Justus Sundermann Gallery exhibitions for several years. With her remarkable understanding of how to bring visual arts and artists to the public, Evelyn will continue to serve Cathedral Arts in a new role as Artistic Director for Visual Arts. Betty Rosenthal has led the Gala and Silent Auction events for several seasons, and she'll be formally recognized as Director for the Annual Gala. Cathedral Arts' much-beloved founder and current Executive Director, Michie Akin, will be gradually reducing his formal duties while remaining a major voice in an emeritus role. Executive Committee/Pillars Campaign Chair Ron Hackemack and Committee Treasurer Wendy Hackemack are retiring to Florida this year (congratulations!). Čathedral Arts would simply not be the successful organization it is without Ron and Wendy's exemplary leadership and service in countless ways over many seasons. They will remain in an advisory capacity during the transition period. Continuing Executive Committee members Betty Anne Hunter, Bob Jones, Cindy Jones, Lisa Jones and Nelson Spencer have been critical to the work of Cathedral Arts for many seasons, and they are poised to assume greater leadership roles in the coming months. Warmest thanks and congratulations to each of these visionary leaders for a job well done, and for helping ensure a bright future for Cathedral Arts!

















2020-21 SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

The Great Hall and Justus Sundermann Gallery suddenly went silent and dark a year ago. All scheduled events were cancelled indefinitely, including the hugely popular annual Gala and Silent Auction and its accompanying financial support. But ingenuity and creativity did not cease. Increasing access to sophisticated web technologies meant that Cathedral Arts could begin to document live music events safely and present them to the public in a permanent online gallery. The Cathedral Arts YouTube Channel has been launched, and already contains a video retrospective of the complete 2019-20 Season, along with three full-length recitals and a Choral Evensong from the Lenten season. An unexpected benefit to Cathedral Arts also arrived in the sharing of these videos with an international audience: a portion of the January 2020 Evensong service was featured in an online musical Advent Calendar containing works by women composers, performed by choirs across the U.S. and U.K. This year's virtual Music by Women Festival at the Mississippi University for Women included two selections from November's Women's Voices II concert. Cathedral Arts now has a worldwide online audience! Videos of Women's Voices II with soprano Courtney Stancil, tenor Christopher A. Leach and pianist Mary Dibbern, Mikhail Berestnev's brilliant solo piano recital in January, and Chloé Trevor's March 2021 Distinguished Artist Recital with pianist Jonathan Tsay have each received hundreds of views, to international acclaim. Artists from previous Justus Sundermann Gallery exhibits graciously provided artworks as backdrops to these videos. Special thanks to artists Carlos Cázares, Erba Gotsman, Anne B. Gunthner, Lori Hochberg, Margo Lee Miller, Connie Sales and Gayle Smithermon Thompson. And many thanks to everyone who participated in documenting these special events and making them available to the public, especially our videographers Francisco Bedoy, Jordan Hammons and Ryan Lescalleet! The remainder of the 2020-21 season features several fine musical events, including a benefit recital by soprano Michelle Perez on May 2, a Choral Evensong on May 16, and a special outdoor performance of the children's opera Jack and the Beanstalk by The Dallas Opera's Touring Production on May 23. Originally scheduled for a YouTube premiere in June, the Three Tenors recital with Francisco Bedoy, Jordan Hammons and Christopher A. Leach, accompanied by Mary Dibbern, has been rescheduled for the Fall. Depending upon safety guidelines, Great Hall events may have a restricted audience or be recorded and posted online.
